

1. This Competition is open to all Members of the Trust and to anyone in the South Lakes/North

Lancashire area who is not a professional photographer.

2. The theme of the competition is 'Rusland Woodlands' and, although there will be only 1 winner, up to 12 entries, corresponding to months of the year, will be selected for a 2022 Calendar. Photographs must have been taken in the Rusland Horizons area and the subject can be any aspect of woodlands (large or small).

3. Only digital photographs will be accepted. These must be submitted to hello@ruslandhorizonstrust.org, Subject field: Photographic Competition, by 13th October 2021. No more than 3 entries will be accepted per entrant.

4. To be eligible, entries must be accompanied by the date and location of each photograph and image files must be between 2 MB and 5 MB, in colour and in landscape format (about 4.3 ratio). Entrants should include their own name, address and telephone number.

COLTON PARISH COUNCIL NEWS

Colton Parish Council met on Monday 13th September at Rusland Reading Rooms putting the days of Zoom meetings firmly in the past. Tony Atkinson from Riddingside Farm raised a common problem of vehicles, large and small, blindly following their satnavs and ending up on totally unsuitable roads. The Clerk will be raising it with Cumbria CC, who are responsible for Highways, to try to get some warning signs put up. Councillors have been asked about the extensive works going on at Hulleter Farm. The site clearance work is for a new agricultural building which hasn't and apparently doesn't need planning permission as it has the status of a permitted development. On a happier note, news came in just before the meeting that the Parish Council's bid to the Highways Greening Fund had been successful in that £7,000 has been awarded. This was formally announced at the successful Green Sparks event on Saturday. Schemes will be brought forward over the next twelve months to 'green up' with wild flowers and native tree planting some of the neglected corners of the Parish. The next Parish Meeting is on Monday 11th October at Finsthwaite Village Hall. HELP FROM CITIZENS ADVICE

Q. I'm a single parent and lost my job during the pandemic. My local Citizens Advice helped me apply for Universal Credit which has been really helpful to cover some of the income I've lost. But I'm very worried about my children, especially buying their school uniforms and shoes, now they are growing so fast! Is there any support out there until I can find another job?
A. If you're on a low income or employed, you might be able to get help with some of the costs of sending your child to school, including school meals, transport and uniform. It's always worth talking to your local education authority to see what support is available.
Free school meals
Children in Reception, Year 1 and Year 2 automatically get free school meals. If you have older children you can apply for free school meals if you get certain benefits. To apply for free school meals you need to contact your local authority, you can check the details at Gov.UK by typing your postcode. Transport Uniforms and other costs
You need to apply to your local education authority for help. There may also be local charitable schemes to help with these costs. It's worth checking with the school to see if it knows of any. If you live in South Lakeland, contact South Lakes Citizens Advice as they may be able to help with sourcing grants. Telephone 015394 46464

CHURCH NEWS

Dear Friends,
Whether we like it or not, all our lives have been affected by recent advances in technology. We are aware of the huge benefits technology has brought to our lives; and we are aware of some of the potential challenges the technological revolution has brought. And there are major challenges still to come. We may even be faced with a particularly tricky question: what is it to be human. Since the industrial revolution, people who work in industry have seen traditional jobs being done more and more by machines, which work much faster and more accurately than any human being can do. And this trend is set to continue. We've all heard about driverless vehicles; but apparently, we are on the cusp of a much bigger revolution which will see robots not only taking over manual labour but also doing sophisticated cognitive work, potentially taking over the work that has hitherto required some human expertise: such as medical diagnosis, financial advice, news journalism and legal judgements. For generations we have defined human beings by what separates us from other animals. What we can do that they can't. But before very long machines are going to share many such abilities, making us wonder what a human being actually is. Is this a crisis or an opportunity? It is an opportunity if we discover that what makes us human is not our ability to do complicated things and think complicated thoughts. Instead what makes us human is our ability to relate, cooperate, and create with each other and with God. This requires us to understand one another, empathise with one another, seek the well-being of one another, and love one another as we love ourselves. And maybe, just maybe, we have an opportunity to become more truly who we were always called to be.
