#### DALE PARK RAINFALL

It will come as no surprise that December was the wettest month of 2023 with 13.02" of rain and only 6 dry days. The total rainfall last year was 97.6" and 132 dry days. This was the second wettest year since my records began in 2003 - the winner was 2012 with 99.05" and only 103 days without rain.

### A WINTER'S TALE

A huge thank you to everyone in Satterthwaite and Grizedale who came to the aid of stranded motorists during the snow on 2<sup>nd</sup> and 3<sup>rd</sup> of December. So many people opened their homes to strangers, providing food, shelter, beds and candles for the night. Special thanks particularly to Simon Brock who co-ordinated efforts and to Gary Thomason who rescued many, and managed to collect emergency oxygen cylinders for Paul Townsend on the Monday, when the delivery van got stuck down the valley. Just another example of what a terrific community we have here. Simon received the following from a grateful waif: "I am Justin, I just wanted to say thank you! Everyone in Satterthwaite was very kind and helpful to the waifs and strays stranded in the snow. I was at the rally, parked up the track at what I know as Low Bowkerstead. By the time I got back down there was a foot of snow on the road and so I had to leave it by the side of the road and walk a mile or so to Satterthwaite, where help for the stranded was being organised in the pub by Simon. That's how I came to be put up in a house, along with a family and a father/son who had also been at the rally.I considered trying to leave on the Sunday, but was firmly talked out of it by Ren, whose nononsense views I greatly enjoyed. So I shovelled snow and then settled in for another night. The power was off from Sat night and all Sun so I kept the fire going and used all the candles (sorry!) to make the living room cosy. On Monday I had a delightfully uneventful drive home to Amersham.My family all thought this was a terrific adventure, but in truth I was always safe, always warm and always fed. My equipment and preparation drew Ren's approval, but it was the generosity of Satterthwaite villagers (present and absent!) which ensured this was a fun tale to tell rather than anything more worrying.

#### **COLTON PARISH COUNCIL NEWS**

Our parish has experienced some very challenging weather this winter already, with heavy snowfall followed by more storms bringing downpours and flooding. During the snowfall many residents were without power for, in some cases, days. In adversity our communities always pull together to help each other, and any visitors caught up the chaos. A huge thanks is due to residents who checked on neighbours, helped clear roads of trees and snow and made sure the most vulnerable were looked after. Massive thanks are also due to our local pubs which acted as support hubs and offered warms meals and company for many. Paul Harris, our superb PCSO was out and about as soon as possible to check on our parish. Finally, our thanks as ever to Archie, our lengthsman, who was out as soon as the roads were passable to clear blocked drains and culverts, particularly at very short notice in Nibthwaite recently where a house suffered flooding. We were highly concerned at the lack of information and on the ground support from Electricity North West (ENW) during the major power outage. No lessons seem to have been learned from Storm Arwen. In some cases, it was more than 36 hours before any real contact was made on the ground. Information provided on the website or via calling the phoneline was useless for many as there was no mobile signal due to the masts rapidly going off-line due to lack of power. Many residents have also been moved to VOIP and so have lost their copper connection to a landline. The local power network clearly lacks any resilience proven by the multiple outages experienced over the past few months even in good weather. We have written to the Chief executive of ENW documenting all outages we are aware of in 2023, expressing our grave concerns and asking for a response on how they intend to improve the network resilience. We copied in Jonathan **Brooks (Head of Westmorland and Furness Council)** who has responded and intends to write a letter of support on our behalf. We also copied in our MP Tim Farron and Suzanne Pender our district councillor who is actively working on this issue with us. If you want to share any information about your local power or flooding situation during any the recent severe weather, please email the clerk (clerk@coltonparishcouncil.org.uk) or talk to your local councillor. The more we know the more evidence we have available.

At our December meeting PCSO Paul Harris updated us about the rural crime team's work including a recent poacher watch initiative. The local community is often best placed to spot and report wildlife crime such poaching activity. You can report online at www.cumbria.police.uk/report-it or phone 101. We are extremely pleased with the input on our community plan priorities from both individuals and businesses and are starting to build an updated plan from this and other information.

#### **CHURCH NEWS**

Dear Friends.

For Christians, Lent - the period between Ash Wednesday and Easter Sunday - is traditionally a time of fasting and repentance. Churches will often be bare of flowers and other adornments as a symbol of the simplicity and solemnity of the season. This ancient tradition has been part of the Western Church's year from its earliest days, in which Christians would abstain from eating meat and drinking wine in the 40 days leading up to Easter. Indeed, it was so well established by the 5th century that St Augustine of Hippo wrote that fasting at other times was voluntary, but not fasting at Lent would be a sin. Whilst there are very few Christians who would still follow the practice of fasting so strictly, it is from here that the tradition of 'giving up' something has grown. In foregoing something we enjoy, we may focus ourselves more on God, reflecting on what it meant for Christ to give up his very life. In the face of such reflection, giving up chocolate or wine or trashy telly becomes rather more trivial.

In more recent years, it has become popular for Christians to 'take up' a spiritual discipline instead of 'give up' a luxury. At a time when all our New Year resolutions have probably fallen by the wayside, taking up an activity for the 40 days of Lent seems an achievable goal. Although maybe a short-term discipline will even become a long-term practice? It is my intention, this Lent, to take up rather than give up. I really enjoy exploring who God is through creativity, so for each of the 40 days, I am going to create something that illustrates where I have met God that day, or seen Him at work. Maybe it will be a painting, or a small piece of knitting, or maybe just an illustrated verse in my journalling Bible. It is so easy to crowd out even the things we enjoy by our own 'busyness,' so that even doing something joyous requires a little discipline.

This Lent, if you choose to give something up or take something up, I pray that it brings you a sense of closeness with God.
