### Invasive Species Removal Work Party: Saturday 13th April



# **CHURCH NEWS**

I am hoping as you read this it will seem as if spring has arrived! As I write, it definitely has not, but here's

hoping for the fabulous days of sunshine that April and May bring to Cumbria. At the same time as this hope of warmer, brighter weather, it might be worth a ponder about Easter – what has actually happened?! I write after returning from a silent retreat during which I was intrigued by looking at Rembrandt's "The Return of The Prodigal Son". In reading this parable in Luke 15:11-32 I was "cut to the heart" by two moments. The first was at the beginning where the younger son asks his father for his inheritance. I feel sorry for the father here. Not only is the younger son saying to his father, in a sense, I wish you were dead, but there is something deeper here. The younger son is saying that all the father has provided him with, is not good enough. What a depressing activity for the father to go through his estate in order to split it in half. Especially sad because the father will have put his heart and soul into his estate in order to provide for his children. Clearly the younger son thinks the grass is greener and he can do better in providing for himself. This is not the case.

Despite the father being hurt by his younger son, a special moment happens when the younger son returns defeated. "While he was still far off, his father saw him and was filled with compassion; he ran and put his arms around him and kissed him" (v20). Even before realising that the younger son has squandered his money, the father runs to meet him, no questions asked. What kind of love is this expressed in such a forgiveness? I suggest it is a divine love.

At Easter, through the death and resurrection of Jesus, God reveals his divine love. He draws us into a deeper relationship with him, forgiving us all for our tendency to go off and do our own thing. I wish you well in continuing to ponder the cross.
